The students are expected to be willing to engage in active learning, accept different disciplinary approaches and cooperate with students of different academic disciplines and different cultural background.

Aim and purpose

This course is embedded in the Minority Changemaker course offered by Grænseforeningen in cooperation with Jaruplund Højskole and SDU. It is a three month "Højskole"-course, which students must attend. A fee is applicable to cover accommodation and meals during the course at Jaruplund Højskole near Flensburg. The course will introduce students on different aspects of the study of minorities, their relation to the ideology of nationalism and their role as objects and subjects in political conflicts. 2020 was the 100th anniversary of the Danish-German border, which was drawn as a result of historical processes leading to a regional division of a border zone into two nation states' territory and the simultaneous institution of national dissenters as national minorities. While controversial in its time, today it is appraised as a model of national reconciliation, border drawing in accord with national self-determination and minority accommodation. This anniversary is the occasion to collect interested students of minority issues in a Højskole-surrounding to study historic and contemporary aspects of national and other minorities in Europe. The course is offered as an elective to students in SDU's bachelor programme on European Studies

▼ Content

The students will be introduced to the following topics:

Identity and group formation

Ethnicity, culture, nationalism and citizenship

National and other minorities Secession & self-determination Nationalism & geopolitics De facto statehood Borders & Ethnonational conflicts

▼ Learning goals

The course will enable the students to apply in-depth knowledge of nationalism and national minorities, their legal, cultural and institutional frameworks into different settings in Europe.

Description of outcome - Knowledge

The students acquire in-depth knowledge on processes of identity and group formation, ethnicity, culture, secession, the development of nations and concepts of citizenship. They will be familiar with the basics of historic, political, cultural and sociological theories on nationalism, geopolitics, national minorities and collective identities. They will be familiar with the principle of national self-determination, and its application in international law. The students will have acquired knowledge on different minority policies at different levels

▼ Description of outcome - Skills

The students will acquire skills of independent learning, group-work and interdisciplinary approaches to research problems. They will improve their skills in oral and written presentation.

Description of outcome - Competences

The students should acquire competencies in applying theory into practice, in analyzing multifaceted political, cultural and economic conflicts evolving around minorities, and in presenting problem-oriented research. They should develop the ability to understand and constructively deal with the complexities involved when working in an interdisciplinary field of study, and the ability to live up to academic

standards, orally as well as in written work Confidence to participate actively in academic discussion
